

FROM FATHER GARABED'S DESK.....

Competition vs. Compassion

Then a dispute arose among them as to which of them would be greatest. And Jesus, perceiving the thought of their heart, took a little child and set him by Himself and said to them, "Whoever receives this little child in My name receives Me; and whoever receives Me receives Him who sent Me. For he who is least among you all will be great." [Lk. 9:46-48]

In this passage from the Gospel according to Saint Luke, Jesus Our Lord challenges us.

Consider this...

Do you compete to prove your significance? Do you crave greatness? Do you measure your self-worth not only by whether you win, but by how much?

Jesus saw that His followers were in the grip of this common way of thinking. So, He placed a child in front of them and affirmed that being like a child and having trusting humility is more desirable to God than any type of competition driven by one's puffed up self-image.

Christ went so far as to state that welcoming the child in His name would be like welcoming Him. While the disciples aspired to positions of power and prestige, their Lord exalted the humble act of serving a child dutifully as more important.

Jesus calls us to follow a very different value system than a world-driven system: What is God-pleasing as opposed to what is self-serving. Position, success, and beating the competition fade in comparison to caring for those around us who are weak, lost or forgotten. Our Lord beckons us as His followers to replace competition with compassion. So consider this: who near you needs affirmation and help?

At *Mer Doon*, they receive upper level education, training for business careers, and a comfortable home shared with other intelligent and motivated young women. *Mer Doon* is headed by Mrs. Julie Ashekian, a previous director of CASP.

ALL ABOUT KUFTEH

Kharpert Kufteh...what memories these words conjure up in the fading memory of my childhood years. Sitting in the kitchen I watched my mother, Vergine Cheteyan, a native of Palu (a few miles east of Kharpert) feed pieces of very lean lamb into her trusted electric food grinder. (Years before, she used a manual grinder, which had a long snake like handle.) I watched with giddy joy as the meat was extruded through the many holes in the grinder's adaptor, making its way out like so many swollen red worms.

The ground lamb was salted and chilled overnight. Meanwhile the filling was prepared: onion, ground meat, parsley and spices were sautéed to perfection and cooled. The next day, the kneading of the ground meat began. I watched with interest as she added fine *bulghur* to the meat between sprinklings of ice cold water. Her hands worked wonders as the wheat fused with the meat. "*Peran't pats*." (Open your mouth!), she would order, as she slipped a sample for me to taste for saltiness.

Once the mixture was "done" she formed it into egg-shaped mounds and set them aside. The filling was brought out and the stuffing began. She took a mound of the meatwheat mixture and nestled it in the palm of her hand. With the other hand she dug a hole in the mound with her thumb, and used her fingers around the perimeter of the hole to create a deep bowl. Into the bowl went a heaping spoonful of filling. The hole was sealed and the shaping began.

The shape of the finished product indicated whether the *kufteh* was truly *Kharpertsi*. It was flying-saucer like and raised in the middle, top and bottom. The flicking of her wrists was magical as she applied drops of cold water to smooth the meat shell. Finally with fingers close together, she slapped the top and bottom of the *kufteh* with her palm, all the while turning it round and round in her well-practiced hands to create the signature edge around the midsection.

Again and again she repeated these steps until about 50 *kuftehs* rested in her white enamel basin with red trim, waiting to be immersed into a deep pot of boiling lamb broth. "When they float to the top, they are done," she advised me. I removed them carefully from the pot, one by one, and set them down to cool. This was the only job I was allowed to do.

In later years I tried and tried to duplicate her movements. I got the taste right, but I could never get the shape just right. Persistence being one of my family's traits, I will keep trying. And when I finally get it right, my mother will say, "Abrees, tsakoogus" ("Well done, my little one"). My mother passed away on January 15, 2009 in New York.

Marriages

Arrangements for weddings are to be made at least eight months in advance. Marriage preparation and counseling are required before the celebration of the sacrament. The Bestman (Khachyeghpayr) must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Church. The parish office will make all necessary arrangements for the deacon, organist and soloist. Marriages are not celebrated during Great Lent.

Baptisms and Chrismations

All baptisms must be scheduled at least two months in advance. Pre-baptismal preparation for the parents and godparents is required. At least one of the godparents must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Faith.

Regulation of Sacramental Services

In accordance with Diocesan discipline mandated by the Primate, Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, all sacraments, e.g. funerals, weddings, baptisms and rites of Christian burial, can only be administered in the church sanctuary, which has been consecrated for the celebrations of these sacred rites.


