As they have done each summer, our St. John Women's Guild prepares breakfast for the building teams and has nourished their appetites to begin their daily work. Thank you, ladies for serving breakfast again on June 23. (Women's Guild members, and Fr. Garabed are pictured at right with Sally LePla, Executive Director, and Brad Irwin, Director of Partnerships for Habitat Oakland County.) Our youth from the Church School and ACYOA Juniors, along with their parents, have also helped in building furniture for the homes under the leadership of Roseann Attar and Lisa Mardigian.

But now there is another opportunity for ALL parishioners of St. John's to do even more and join in with building teams in Pontiac.

Our hope is to have our own parishioners who can't commit to going to Armenia for three weeks but would like to help build a home, a life, a community just a few miles away take part in the Habitat initiative here locally. As the pastor of St. John's, I am a member of the Michigan Clergy Council for Habitat and now turn to you, our parishioners, to join in this tremendously rewarding effort.

St. John's Helps Special Children In Armenia


The parishioners of St. John's have once again assisted their brothers and sisters in Armenia. During the Spring of this year about \$3,000 was collected to provide humanitarian assistance for the Medical Psychological Education Evaluation Center, a school for children with special needs in Stepanavan, Armenia. This facility was in need of major renovation, including a new roof, doors, windows, and interior painting. The center, built in 1960, is currently home to 47 children between 7-15 years of age, all of whom have special needs and live at the school ten months out of the year. The staff consists of 22 teachers who provide instruction in all subject areas in grades 1-9. As always, the St. John's community eagerly responded and reached out to help meet the needs of this school.

MEETYOUR PARISH COUNCIL.....



From John Yavruian, Parish Council Chairman: I was born in Highland Park and baptized at St. John Armenian Church on Oakman Boulevard. Both my parents were born in Turkey. My dad was from Van and my mom from Izmit. They experienced early life traumas, which were not discussed in front of me. My parents maintained high levels of individual integrity while sharing their deep love of family. Both were eager to succeed in a country that offered them so much.

I attended Sunday School regularly before and after my father died in 1958. I was active in the ACYOA Juniors for four years then I attended Wayne State University and there I discovered the world outside of my family and the Armenian Community. I taught in an alternative school after college and made some remarkable friends. After working at Ford Motor Car Company I left the country to travel for about two years to travel. I visited major centers of western civilization; London, Paris, Rome, Athens, Cairo and Constantinople.

I landed in Jerusalem where I decided to teach English to orphans from Lebanon who were living in the Seminary. I wanted to enhance knowledge of the Armenian Language and it seemed a good place for me to start. It was at that time I decided to read the Bible start to finish. That is probably not the recommended way but that is how I learned a great deal in those nine months. Reluctantly, I returned to

the United States and reentered a world that had become somewhat foreign. To honor my father, I decided to manage the property he had acquired and that my mother had doubled in size. My mother was aging and in reality, the property was not producing any meaningful income.

Twenty years pass. In 2003, my mother leaves the earthly vessel that has contained her spirit. Her wishes were respected. My parents never lived to taste the fruit from their garden. That was their gift to their children. Whatever service I offer comes from the bounty God has generously provided to me through my parents.

Sara Andonian, a member of Parish Council for four years, three as Treasurer, has also served the St. John community as a Church School Teacher for more than a decade, chaired and filled various roles for both the ACYOA Juniors and Seniors including treasurer on the Central Council and is a member of the Women's Guild.

When asked about her life goal she says that it is "to preserve and pass along the teachings of the Armenian Christian Church. When teaching teenagers in Church School, my goal is to teach them to feel comfortable with their religion and our church - so that no matter where life takes them in this world, they can enter an Armenian Apostolic Church and feel like they are at home."

Her work on the Parish Council "stems from my 'numbers' background. I, myself, feel that I am a fiduciary of the treasury of the church. In such a role, I find that I am constantly trying to preserve our treasures, expand programs for the youth, provide teaching of our faith, save for the future, and spend now to make our home as comfortable and welcoming as possible. All of this makes for a massive headache some weeks!"

Sara is a familiar face to St. John parishioners of all generations and has been and will continue to be a vital part of the community.

We are almost half way through the calendar year and some budgetary realities are becoming clear. Our facility is aging. Structural improvements and certain maintenance items are demanding immediate attention. This requires that we sit down with representatives of the Apostolic Society to formulate a comprehensive plan to address the long-term goals, as well as the short term steps we need to take to maintain a viable facility for St John. Our new Administrator, Tom Stamboulian, has inventoried the facility's needs and has created a document that will be used to set our priorities, moving forward. In order to maximize our chances for success we must begin to think holistically. If we are going to become effective problem solvers, we will have to revisit some of the assumptions we have held that blur our vision.

In order to address the budgetary shortfall we anticipated coming out of the Annual Meeting, the Parish Council implemented a Capital Fund Drive. The goal to raise \$50,000 between Memorial Day and Labor Day was the result of Council's commitment to balance the budget. The Community's response to the campaign has been inspiring. In the first two weeks of the campaign we have collected \$16,980 from 71 donors. Bravo!

This year has witnessed the revival of the Men's Society. David Aprahamian, a newly elected member to the Parish Council, was asked to spearhead this endeavor by Father Garabed. Those of you who attended the Wine Tasting Fund Raiser sponsored by the Men's Society know what an asset our Community has created for itself.

Another gift the Community has given itself is the Kef Klub. Diane Ekizian and Marianne Dardarian came before the Parish Council and shared their vision. The Parish Council merely got out of their way so that they could make their vision a reality. Others have also stepped forward. Rita Jury, Solange Messelian and Anita Arslanian created the Michael Aram Trunk Show which netted the Church \$3,000.

The Parish Council has asked Paul Yousoufian, another newly elected member of the Council, to organize and structure the Festival in such a way as to spread the ownership of the event. We all know the Festival belongs to everyone. It is an expression of our Community. It is a gift the Community gives to itself. It requires much work, but it also provides us with a great deal of satisfaction. Be aware that the dates for the Festival have changed. The Festival will begin on Tuesday, September 21 and run through Sunday, September 26, 2010.

FYI: A suggestion box has been placed in the Lobby of the Church for your convenience. You may have an idea you would like the Council to consider. You may have had an experience that you feel the Council needs to address. We want to hear from you!

This is my third year on the Council and my second year serving as its Chairman. While the opportunity to serve our community means a great deal to me, nothing compares to the joy I experience singing in the choir. From my first day, I knew this is where I belonged. I thank God every day for the blessings He has bestowed on me and the privilege to worship Him with those I know and love.


Volunteers Make It Happen!

Marriages

Arrangements for weddings are to be made at least eight months in advance. Marriage preparation and counseling are required before the celebration of the sacrament. The Bestman (Khachyeghpayr) must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Church. The parish office will make all necessary arrangements for the deacon, organist and soloist. Marriages are not celebrated during Great Lent.

Baptisms and Chrismations

All baptisms must be scheduled at least two months in advance. Pre-baptismal preparation for the parents and godparents is required. At least one of the godparents must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Faith.

Regulation of Sacramental Services

In accordance with Diocesan discipline mandated by the Primate, Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, all sacraments, e.g. funerals, weddings, baptisms and rites of Christian burial, can only be administered in the church sanctuary, which has been consecrated for the celebrations of these sacred rites.

Bags of Blessings are finally here for our young ones!

"Bags of Blessings for Young Children" are filled with 'quiet entertainment' for young children to use during the Divine Liturgy. The contents of the bag will help them to sit quietly throughout the service while their parents are worshipping. Keep in mind that there are some small items, therefore, please use parental discretion as you look through the bag.

Inside the bag are approximately eight board books ranging from short stories to picture books, all with Bible themes. Also in the bag is a five piece Nativity finger puppet set, two Bible figurines that each come with a small book telling the story of the person the figure represents, a pack of Bible Story cards that range from memory matching to Bible hero stories, and a drawing board.

- For babies, there are soft finger puppets and board books to capture their attention as they quietly sit through the service.
- For toddlers, they too will enjoy flipping through the books, looking at the pictures and playing with the other items in the bag.
- Older children will be able to enjoy reading the short stories and using the set of cards to learn Bible information.

These bags were designed for children who have difficulty sitting still and focusing completely during the service. The contents in the "Bags of Blessings" are to help the children occupy their attention and at the same time assist the parents to focus more on aspects of worship. We hope that this gives not only the children more opportunities to sit longer through the Divine Liturgy, but helps parents follow the *Badarak* with less distraction.

The bags will be hanging on a stand at the entrance of the church sanctuary. When you take a bag for your child[ren], please be sure to return it to the stand.


